Part 1: Find a News Story

Find a news story to evaluate. You have three options:

- 1. Go to your Twitter account and select an online news story that appears in your feed
- 2. Go to your Facebook account and select an online news story that appears in your feed
- 3. Select one of the news stories below:

Please note: you are not evaluating a webpage. You are specifically looking for a news story, essentially an article that discusses current or recent news. It will likely be part of a larger website that contains a collection of news stories. The larger website should look like an online newspaper, with a variety of headlines, articles, links, and other newsy items.

Us, etc. to verify. Who are they? What did you	
find out about them?	
Go to the news story's home page (the main	1.
page of the online newspaper the news story is	2.
in). List the titles of two other news stories	
posted on that page.	
Briefly scan both news stories. What are your	
first impressions of the news stories? Do they	
influence how you feel about the news story you	
selected and the Authority of the site?	
Is there a Contact page/info? If so, does the

of this site?

Read beyond the headline. Does the content of	
the news story support what the headline says?	
Does the news story use sources to support the claims? Do the sources actually exist? (Click one or two of them to find out.)

the purpose of the organization sponsoring the	
website on which your news story appears? Is the	
information provided in the news story and on	
the site biased? Objective? Fact? Opinion?
